Operation Snap is a [secure online platform](#) that allows you to submit video evidence of driving offences that you or other members of the public have witnessed. Its purpose is to improve road safety and to prosecute those that place others at risk. The service has been produced with the support of the Department for Transport.

The online service allows us to effectively deal with the footage recorded by members of the public in a safe and secure way, whilst making the investigation process simple and straightforward. We have a determined and robust approach to policing the roads and we'll take every opportunity to make them safer for everyone.

This portal can only be used for driving offences, it is not for submitting footage of Road Traffic Collisions or public order offences, and is not for reporting crime.

The offences that we can investigate through Operation Snap include:

- **dangerous driving/driving without due care and attention**
 - **careless driving**
- **using a mobile phone handheld whilst driving**
 - **not wearing a seat belt**
 - **ignoring a red traffic light**
 - **disregarding solid white lines**
 - **close passes of cyclists**
 - **Zigzag lines (outside school)**
 - **Zigzag lines (pedestrian crossing)**
 - **Wilful obstruction**
 - **Unnecessary obstruction**

Operation Snap has one desired outcome: making our roads safer.

Understanding the Role and Responsibilities of a Parish Council

Just what is a Parish Council and what does a parish council do?

An English parish council is a local government body that represents the interests of a specific geographical area known as a parish. Parish councils are the most local level of government in England and play a vital role in the democratic process. In this article, we will explore the duties of a parish council, the eligibility criteria for joining, and the rules that apply to these councils.



Duties of an English Parish Council

Parish councils have a range of responsibilities, which can vary depending on the size and needs of the community they serve. Some common duties of an English parish council **may** include:

- Providing and maintaining community facilities such as village halls, playgrounds, and sports grounds.
- Managing public spaces and local amenities, including parks, cemeteries, and allotments.
- Contributing to local planning decisions by reviewing and commenting on planning applications.
- Supporting local initiatives and community projects, such as environmental initiatives or youth programs.
- Working in collaboration with other local authorities and organizations to address the needs of the community.
- Representing the interests of the parish and its residents on various issues, including public safety, transportation, and infrastructure.

- Setting and managing a budget, funded through the precept, which is a small portion of the council tax paid by residents.

Eligibility to Join a Parish Council

Anyone can join a parish council, provided they meet certain eligibility criteria. To become a parish councillor, an individual must:

- Be at least 18 years old.
- Be a British citizen, a citizen of the Commonwealth, or a citizen of any other state who is legally resident in the UK. Citizens of the European Union (EU) may also be eligible, but laws are slowly changing since the United Kingdom left the EU.
- Have lived, worked, or owned land within the parish for at least 12 months
- Not be disqualified from holding office as a result of a criminal conviction or bankruptcy.

Rules Applicable to Parish Councils

Parish councils operate within a legal framework outlined by the Local Government Act 1972 and subsequent legislation. Some key rules that apply to parish councils include:

Meetings must be open to the public, and minutes of the meetings must be made available to the public.

- Decisions must be made collectively by the council, following proper debate and voting procedures.
- Parish councils must adhere to financial regulations and keep accurate records of their income and expenditure.
- Parish councillors have a duty to act in the best interests of the community and abide by a code of conduct.
- Parish councils have limited powers compared to higher levels of local government, such as district or county councils. They must work within the boundaries of their authority.

Joining a parish council provides an opportunity for individuals to actively participate in local decision-making and contribute to the betterment of their community. By understanding the duties and rules applicable to parish councils, aspiring councillors can prepare themselves for the responsibilities that come with this important role.

Fundraising

Finding the money to finance an event or festival, equip a village hall or bankroll some other project is not always easy. There are many upfront costs that must be met before revenue starts to come in. Even after your endeavour starts to generate returns there can still be worrying shortfalls.

This multi-part article looks at ways to raise funds for your fete, festival, band, or event. I will smash a few myths and show you ways to tap into the various sources of money that are out there and available to you.

We will be looking at **donations, grants, corporate social responsibility (CSR), crowd funding** and **sponsorships**. In the first part of this series of articles, we will be dealing with the oft-misunderstood subject of **sponsorship** and touching on CSR.

Sponsorship

Terminology

In the world of sponsorship, your festival, tour, band, or event is known as a ‘**property**’ and the people that attend your event, use your facility or follow you form the ‘**audience**’. This is the terminology that I will use throughout this article.

What is a Sponsorship

The gov.uk website states; *“Sponsorship is a payment to a charity, social project or a business for which the sponsor receives something in return. Payment may be in the form of money, goods and services (commonly referred to as ‘barter’), or a combination of money with goods and services.”*

Contrary to what many believe, a sponsor is not an altruist dishing out free money to properties. Sponsors are not philanthropists and do not have pots of spare money lying around for doling out to every Tom, Dick or Harry asking for financial support. However, sponsors do have budgets to buy something from you and that ‘something’ must give them a commercial return on their investment.

‘**Investment**’ is a key word. The sponsor views sponsorship as an investment which must be safe and offer a return.

What you are looking to do with a sponsor is to create a win-win situation, where

you benefit from funding and/or goods and services, and the sponsor gets viable and tangible benefits from the sponsorship package that you sell to them. Remember, a sponsor will not be interested in your property unless they can get something of value from it.

The most valuable thing you can offer to a sponsor is the hearts, minds and buying power of your audience. Your audience is not just the people that attend your event or watch you play but also the followers you have built up on social media channels such as Twitter and Facebook. Your task is to convince a sponsor that your audience is of more value to them than any other audience. For this reason, you must **'know your audience'**.

To entice sponsors, you need to be able to tell them things about your audience like the age group, gender split, likes, income bracket, motivations, distance travelled etc. You must research the demographics, psychographics, and geographical distribution of your audience. Sponsors will already have their own brand audience and if you can broadly match that audience with yours in both demographics and interests, you are on to a winner.

Knowing and growing your audience is a whole new subject which I hope to cover, in depth, in a future article.

Finding a Sponsor

Start at home. Ask your management team, volunteers, friends, and family if they have any contacts in any businesses or companies that might be interested in sponsoring your property. Approaching a potential sponsor through a mutual contact is a much easier way in and gives you a much better chance of striking a sponsorship deal.

If you have a **LinkedIn** account, sift through your contacts for potential sponsors and for people that can introduce you to possible sponsors. If you do not have a LinkedIn account, it's a good idea to open one and to start building a professional business network.

The best and most effective match between sponsor and property is achieved when there is a **common interest**. For instance, when a sports brand sponsors a sport event, or a food company sponsors a food and drink festival. Thus, this kind of synergy is the first thing to look for in a potential sponsor.

Another good idea is to keep a check on your **local newspapers**. Watch for companies spending a lot on advertising or taking out full page spreads. Any

company doing this is spending heavily to reach your local community. The chances are they will be a good target for you and might jump at the chance of sponsoring a local property.

Are there any companies that are going to be causing **major disruption** in your locality? If so, they may be another possible sponsor for you to home in on. An example of this is the sponsorship deal I helped to broker between a festival and a company that were digging up a lot of roads in the area. The company in question were keen to develop goodwill in the community and did so by sponsoring our event.

Search the Internet for **other properties** that are like yours. Examine their websites to identify the companies that are sponsoring them. Use the garnered information to build a list of likely sponsors. Add to that list of companies by seeking out similar companies and brands.

While looking at other property's websites, take the opportunity to check out the type of sponsorship deals and packages they are offering. This will help when putting together your own offerings.

Most companies are keen to show that they trade ethically, are green or have low carbon footprints, support communities, are non-discriminatory, and so on. This is all part of their **Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)** commitment.

Checking a company's CSR policy may help you to find a match with what you are doing. If, for instance, the company's policy talks about supporting children and your event is for children, they may be more ready to sponsor it. Likewise, if your event or tour is dedicated to achieving a low or zero carbon footprint the potential sponsor may be keen to associate themselves with that goal to further emphasise their own green credentials.

In addition to helping you to find a sponsor, CSR checking may also show you where there are grants available.

Do not forget the **small local businesses**. For instance, restaurants, hotels, convenience shops, take-aways, and any others that might benefit from tapping into your audience.

The Wold Cottage Meteorite

The Wold Cottage meteorite (pictured below) is a remarkable celestial object that made its way to the East Riding of Yorkshire, captivating scientists and locals alike.



In this article, we will delve into the intriguing story of this meteorite, exploring where and when it fell, what was learned from its discovery, and where it is currently located.

The Fall of the Wold Cottage Meteorite

The Wold Cottage meteorite descended upon the picturesque landscape of the East Riding of Yorkshire on December 13, 1795. Witnesses reported a bright fireball streaking across the sky, followed by a loud explosion. It landed within a few yards of ploughman (or possibly shepherd) John Shipley. The impact site is located on the estate of Wold Cottage near Wold Newton, hence the name of the meteorite.

Wold Cottage was, at the time, home to a magistrate named Major Edward Topham. The major was a soldier, journalist, author, critic, playwright, caricature engraver and a dandy well known and respected in London's fashionable circles due to his unique style of dress and elegant manners.

It was Topham that publicised the meteorite by putting it on display in London where he charged a fee of one shilling to view it. Then in 1799 he built a brick monument to mark the spot that was the meteorite's point of impact.





The inscription on the monument reads:

On this spot, Dec 13th, 1795
fell from the Atmosphere
AN EXTRAORDINARY STONE
In Breadth 28 inches
In Length 30 inches
and whose Weight was 56 Pounds.

THIS COLUMN
in memory of it
was erected by
EDWARD TOPHAM
1799

Upon impact, the meteorite created a small crater approximately 1 yard (0.91 m) across and embedded itself in the underlying chalk rock to a depth of 7 inches (180 mm), passing through 12 inches (300 mm) of topsoil.

The event sparked curiosity among the local population, leading to further investigations, scientific interest and the first serious investigation into the origins of meteorites. Early theories were that these falling stones were thrown into the air by the Earth's volcanic activity, ejected from volcanoes on the moon or formed in the Earth's atmosphere. The overriding consensus of the time was that these stones did not fall from space. However, Topham helped counter this view with the witness statements that he collected.

Scientific Discoveries and Insights

The Wold Cottage meteorite is classified as an L6 ordinary chondrite, a type of meteorite that contains both silicates and metallic minerals. This classification places it among the most common type of meteorites found on Earth. It ranks as the largest meteorite observed to fall in Britain and the second-largest recorded in Europe (surpassed only by the Ensisheim meteorite).

Scientists were particularly intrigued by the Wold Cottage meteorite due to its pristine condition, as it had not undergone significant weathering or alteration since its fall. This made it an invaluable specimen for studying the composition and origins of

meteorites.

Through meticulous analysis, researchers discovered that the Wold Cottage meteorite contains a diverse range of minerals, including olivine, pyroxene, and plagioclase. These minerals provide insights into the processes that occurred during the formation of our solar system.

Furthermore, isotopic studies conducted on the meteorite's samples revealed valuable information about the age of the solar system. By measuring the ratios of certain isotopes, scientists were able to estimate that the Wold Cottage meteorite formed approximately 4.56 billion years ago, around the same time as other meteorites found on Earth.

Additionally, the study of the meteorite contributed to our understanding of the early solar system's dynamics. The presence of shock-induced features within the meteorite indicated that it had experienced significant impact events during its journey through space.

The Current Location of the Wold Cottage Meteorite

After its discovery, the Wold Cottage meteorite fragments were dispersed among various collectors and institutions. Today, one of the largest fragments is proudly displayed at the Natural History Museum in London, where it continues to captivate visitors with its extraterrestrial origins.

It is worth noting that while the Wold Cottage meteorite is a significant scientific specimen, it is not the only meteorite to have fallen in the United Kingdom. Over the years, several other meteorites have been discovered across the country, each with its own unique story to tell.

The Falling Stone

Despite frequent reports placing them in Wold Newton, both Wold Cottage and the monument to the meteorite are situated within the parish of Thwing & Octon. However, it remains accurate that Wold Newton village is in close proximity. Notably, the now-defunct pub on Main Street in Thwing bore the name “The Falling Stone”, a nod to the Wold Cottage meteorite.

NB The monument is on private land. Should you wish to visit it, you must first get permission from the owners of Wold Cottage.

4. NO exhibits to be removed before 5pm
5. Prize money will not be paid before the presentation of prizes has taken place.
6. Prize money not collected on the day will be donated to show funds.
7. Presentation of prizes will not take place before 5pm.
8. Certificates of merit will be awarded to those exhibits placed 1st, 2nd and 3rd in each class.
9. Acceptance of the custody of trophies, for the time being, shall be deemed sufficient guarantee that he/she thereby agrees and undertakes to return the trophies at least 7 days prior to the next annual show, at no cost to the organisers.
10. All trophy winners will be expected to have names engraved on the trophy that they win before the next annual show. If we end up doing this then the winner will be billed accordingly.
11. All exhibits must be the property of the exhibitor.

Point for the trophies will be awarded as follows:

1st = 3 points 2nd = 2 points 3rd = 1 point

Where more than 1 entry is exhibited in a class, only the highest placed entry will qualify for points towards the trophies.

12. Classes 32 to 35 inc are only open to farmers and farm managers
13. In class 1 a maximum of 2 entries will be accepted per household.
14. In no case will the organisers be held responsible for any loss or damage to any exhibit, though every care will be taken for their safety.
15. Exhibits exceeding any stated dimensions **WILL** be disqualified.

Dog Fouling



It has been brought to the attention of Wold Newton parish council that there appears to be an increase in the number of incidents of dog fouling in the village.

Wold Newton is a lovely village and we would urge dog owning residents and visitors to be responsible owners and pick up after their dogs to keep it that way. There are litter bins at the Pinfold at top of village, by the bus stop opposite the pond and along Rainsburgh Lane that can be used to deposit dog waste.

The village has a Public Space Protection Order in place that is managed by East Riding Of Yorkshire Council, EYRC, which means that anyone who fails to pick up after their dog would be subject to a £75 fine.

Unfortunately there is no such thing as the dog poo fairy so anyone aware of dog fouling in the village can report it to EYRC at www.eastriding.gov.uk/dogs

Step-by-Step Guide – Defibrillator

1. **Call 999:** Immediately call for emergency assistance before starting to use the device.
2. **Start CPR:** If the individual is not breathing or not breathing normally, begin CPR immediately. Perform chest compressions rapidly and firmly.
3. **Turn on the AED:** Power on the automated external defibrillator (AED) and follow the voice prompts.
4. **Attach Pads:** Expose the individual's chest and attach the defibrillator pads. One pad should be placed on the right upper chest, the other below the left breast.
5. **Stand Clear & Analyse:** Ensure that no one is touching the individual. Press the 'analyse' button if the AED does not automatically start analysing the heart rhythm.
6. **Deliver Shock:** If the AED advises a shock, ensure everyone is clear and press the 'shock' button.
